Program Notes

Fuller University Band

Rumba De La Tumba

Duration: 3:20

JaRod Hall is a Texas-native composer, educator and performer. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of North Texas where he studied conducting with Nicholas Williams and Dennis Fisher. JaRod's bands have received consistent sweepstakes awards at the Texas University Interscholastic League Concert and Sightreading Evaluations, as well as being recognized at the state level.

JaRod is a tuba and trombone player by trade and has been a part of many esteemed ensembles such as the North Texas Wind Symphony and Symphonic Band, 3 O'Clock Lab Band, Carrollton Wind Symphony, and Metropolitan Winds.

Program note from publisher:

Journey into the unknown with this wildly creative piece by JaRod Hall, inspired by the playfully dark film scores of Danny Elfman. *Rumba de la Tumba* is based on an irresistible Latin-flavored groove while also giving a lighthearted nod to the world of the macabre. Haunting, yet electrifying.

Earth Song

Duration: 3:25

Frank Ticheli is an American composer and conductor.

Ticheli joined the faculty of the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music in 1991, where he served as Professor of Composition until 2023. From 1991 to 1998, Ticheli was Composer in Residence of the Pacific Symphony, and he still enjoys a close working relationship with that orchestra and their music director, Carl St. Clair. Program note from the composer:

Earth Song for concert band is the grandchild of *Sanctuary* for concert band. Almost as soon as I completed *Sanctuary*, I became intrigued by the idea of making a choral version of at least part of the work. Within the same year, I realized this goal, inventing a poem that reflected the music's poignant lyricism, fitting the rhythmic stresses and melodic contour of *Sanctuary's* melody. Thus, *Earth Song* for chorus came to be.

Six years after composing *Sanctuary*, in 2012, I received an email from Frank Troyka, director of bands at Berkner High School in Richardson, Texas, inquiring if I might consider making a concert band version of *Earth Song* for one of his colleagues. The irony of his request was not lost on either of us, but we both agreed that, in a sense, this full circle back to the music's concert band origins would allow me to create a grandchild possessing the genetic strengths of both its ancestors: the rich textured lyricism and more concise nature of its choral forebear, combined with the wider color palette and expressive power of its concert band forebear.

Thus, *Earth Song* for concert band was born: a more concise (and less technically demanding) descendant of *Sanctuary*.

JitterBug!

Bob (Robert) Buckley is a Canadian-based composer and arranger. He has studios in Vancouver, Montreal and Holland.

Bob has a diverse career as a composer, arranger, performer, producer, recording artist and conductor. In the pop world, he has created several albums and hit songs with labels such as CBS and A&M. The number one single *Letting Go* won him a gold record. He has conducted and arranged for major artists such as Michael Bublé, Bryan Adams, Celine Dion, Our Lady Peace, Simple Plan and Aerosmith, to name a few. In the film and television world, he has scored many award-winning shows for Disney, Alliance, ABC, FOX, CBS, PBS, CBC and the Cartoon Network.

Program note from the publisher:

Jitterbug! was commissioned by the West Vancouver (BC) Youth Band --Douglas Macaulay, director -- in tribute to "Canada's King of Swing", Dal Richards.

Rippling Watercolors

Duration: 4:10

Brian Balmages is an active trumpeter composer, conductor, producer, and performer.

His fresh compositional ideas have been heralded by many performers and directors, resulting in a high demand of his works for winds, brass, and orchestra. He received his Bachelors of Music from James Madison University and his master's degree from the University of Miami in Florida. Mr. Balmages studied trumpet with James Kluesner, Don Tison, and Gilbert Johnson.

Program note from the composer:

Many often underestimate the extensive colors, harmonies, and emotional range that are often achievable in younger ensembles. It is in this spirit that the musical lines of *Rippling Watercolors* were born. This was not meant to be a lyrical piece for younger ensembles; rather, it was written as a fully expressive lyrical work that happens to be playable by younger ensembles. I believe there is a significant difference. No phrases were truncated, no ranges were "limited," and no rhythms were watered down for the sake of playability. This piece just happens to be attainable by younger groups, yet the music exists exactly as it would even if I had written this for a college group.

The title comes from a range of inspiration. I often get asked about my last name. As most can imagine, there are very few of us left in the world. At present, my wife and I are one of only two couples in the United States that can carry on our family name. My cousins Ben and Carrie on the West Coast are the other couple, and they now have two beautiful girls. We all share a lot of beliefs -- we encourage our children to be creative, spontaneous, and we enjoy watching where their imaginations take them. The idea for this piece came from a simple set of watercolors. When children get hold of these and use their imagination, the most amazing things can happen. Children can see things that adults never see. They open our minds while we help them grow and learn. With a little imagination, these watercolors can become a magnificent sunrise or sunset over the ocean, a gorgeous view from a mountaintop, or an image of a supernova in space. The smallest drop can change the pattern and create something entirely new, either with a brush or entirely within nature. It is my hope that Lily and Charlotte grow up with an infinite palette of watercolors, and that every drop creates a new, fantastic world.

Rippling Watercolors was commissioned by the Springer Middle School Bands in Wilmington, Delaware; Robert J. Baronio, director. It is dedicated to my cousins Lily and Charlotte Balmages, who, combined with my two boys, form the next generation of the Balmages name in the United States.

Rocketship!

Duration: 4:20

Kevin Day is a composer, conductor, producer and multi-instrumentalist from Arlington, Texas.

Day's father was a prominent hip-hop producer in the late 1980s, and his mother was a sought-after gospel singer, singing alongside the likes of <u>Mel</u> <u>Tormé</u> and Kirk Franklin. Kevin Day plays euphonium and tuba and is a self-taught pianist and composer. He received a Bachelor of Music degree in euphonium/tuba performance from Texas Christian University (TCU), studying under Richard Murrow for tuba and euphonium and Dr. Neil Anderson-Himmelspach and <u>Till MacIvor Meyn</u> for composition. He holds a Master of Music in Composition from the University of Georgia, studying with composers <u>Peter Van Zandt Lane</u> and <u>Emily Koh</u>, and conductor Cynthia Johnston Turner.

Mr. Day began studies for his DMA at the University of Miami (Fla.) in the fall of 2021. In 2024 he joined the faculty at the University of California San Diego as a lecturer in theory and musicianship.

Program note by Cole Hairston for the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, University Band concert program:

Rocketship! is an energetic concert piece formed by two sections which express energy in different ways. The first is composed of short rhythmic patterns that start quietly before building to the end of each phrase. The second section introduces a marching snare drum solo accompanied by open fifths, known as power chords, in the winds. Brief motives accompany the sustained power chords, but quickly dissipate as a new motive begins. The different sections shrink as the composition develops until they are played one after the other at the very end.

Jaime Texidor Dalmau was a composer, conductor, and publisher who lived much of his life in Baracaldo, a picturesque city in northern Spain.

He was born in Barcelona in (1885, according to records Baracaldo Municipal Band Hall) reportedly played saxophone military band for several years. In 1927 he became conductor of the Baracaldo Municipal Band, succeeding Sr. Alberdi who had founded the organization in 1902. Texidor conducted band until 1936 and, during that time, composed and arranged so much music that he decided to establish his publishing company. Many of his works were republished by Editorial Musica Moderna of Madrid and Boosey & Hawkes of London.

Program note by the publisher:

Amparito Roca was composed in 1925 by Spanish musician, conductor and composer Jaime Texidor. Its first performance took place in September of 1925 in the theater El Siglo in the town of Carlet where the composer lived at the time. It is a pasodoble and one of the better-known pieces of Spanish music around the world. The score was published in Madrid later in 1925 by Música Moderna.

Paso dobles became very popular with U.S. Bands throughout the sixties and a few of those, including *Amparito Roca* have remained a part of established concert band repertoire.

Where Words End...

Duration: 4:00

Randall D. Standridge is an American composer and arranger. Randall Standridge received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Arkansas State University. During this time, he studied composition with Tom O'Connor, before returning to Arkansas State University to earn his master's in music composition, studying with Tom O'Connor and Tim Crist. In 2001, he began his tenure as director of bands at Harrisburg High School in Harrisburg, Arkansas. He left this post in 2013 to pursue a career as a full-time composer and marching arts designer.

Program note by the publisher:

Sometimes, music is not "about" anything. It exists solely for the beautiful sounds it creates and the emotions derived from that aesthetic experience. *Where Words End...* falls firmly into this category of music. This expressive piece makes creative use of the ranges and colors available for young bands to create a truly remarkable new work for students and directors alike. "Where words end, music begins..."

New Wade'n Water Duration: 3:15

Adolphus Hailstork is an American composer. Hailstork began his musical training as a child on piano. He received his doctorate in composition from Michigan State University, where he was a student of H. Owen Reed. He completed earlier studies at the Manhattan School of Music under Vittorio Giannini and David Diamond, the American Institute at Fontainebleau with Nadia Boulanger, and Howard University with Mark Fax.

"What can an artist do?" asks Adolphus Hailstork, "I can speak on the issues and put them in my work. These are the tragedies and triumphs of a people who have been beaten up for 400 years. Does anyone speak for them? Who writes pieces that speak for the existence of African Americans in the United States? I'll take on that job."

Program note by the publisher:

A contemporary adaptation of the traditional African American spiritual *Wade in the Water*.

Cait Nishimura is a Canadian composer, musician, and educator. Ms. Nishimura holds Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Education degrees from the University of Toronto.

Known for writing nature-inspired, programmatic music, Cait has quickly established herself as a prominent voice in the concert band community. Cait's music has been presented at The Midwest Clinic, MusicFest Canada, and numerous other conferences and festivals across North America. Her work has become increasingly popular among educational music programs and within the professional new music scene, with new works being regularly commissioned and performed by ensembles and individuals around the world.

Program note by the composer:

Autumn was originally composed for SATB choir and was later transcribed for wind band by the composer. The choral version features original text inspired by seasonal scenic imagery. The setting for wind band stays true to the pacing and character of the original, with added instrumental texture and colour.

The sun hides low in the sky igniting the forest with rays of light. The air lies motionless until a gentle wind whispers, disrupting this peace. With this wind dances a colourful melancholy, painting the seasons with brushstrokes of time. Memories swirl in this cool breeze. though warmth lingers in the arms of trees holding on until the last single leaf falls.

Volatus Duration: 2:40

Brian Beck is an American composer, arranger and music educator. Mr. Beck holds a bachelor's degree in music education from Texas A&M University-Commerce and a master's degree in music education from the University of Houston.

He served for many years at the Duncanville Independent School District as a band director at Byrd Middle School and beginner instructor at Brandenburg Intermediate School. Both Symphonic I and II Bands at Byrd Middle School have received consistent Superior ratings at UIL concert and sight-reading contests as well as Best in Class awards at other contests and festivals. The Symphonic I Band has been a consistent finalist in the TMEA Honor Band competition each year and has been selected as Texas State Honor Band a record three times (1982, 2004, and 2008). The Duncanville High School Wind Ensemble was also selected as the 5A Texas State Honor Band for a historic third time. This is also the first time in TMEA's history that a AAAAA high school and its feeder CCC school have won in back-to-back competitions simultaneously.

Program note from the score:

The title is taken from the Latin word for flight, which fits this musical presentation that captures the art of soaring above the clouds. Lift-off begins with stately brass statements and sparkling percussion, then it is up, up and away with dancing woodwind flourishes. With angular harmonies, driving rhythms in mixed meters, and emphatic percussive effects, you'll find there's something for everyone to enjoy.

Biographies

Dr. Mack Wood is in his fifth year the Associate Director of Bands and Director of the Big Red Marching Machine at Illinois State University. Prior to his appointment at ISU, he was a graduate assistant and pursuing a Doctorate of Music and Arts degree in Wind Conducting at The University of Miami, Frost School of Music where he studies primarily with Dr. Robert M. Carnochan. Mack also has the great fortune to learn from Dr. J. Steven Moore, conductor of the Frost Symphonic Winds and Dean of Undergraduate Admissions, Professor Jay C. Rees, Director of Athletic Bands, and Professor Douglas McCullough, Assistant Director of Athletic Bands. At the Frost School of Music, Mack has the opportunity to assist and guest conduct the Frost Wind Ensemble, Frost Symphonic Winds, and co-conducts the University Band with his fellow graduate colleagues. Mack also has the opportunity to assist with all aspects of the Frost Band of the Hour marching band, including arranging some pep band charts.

Prior to his time at The University of Miami, Mack was a Graduate Assistant pursuing a Masters Degree at Louisiana State University where he studied Wind Conducting with Dr. Damon Talley, Dr. Dennis Llinás, and Dr. Kelvin Jones. He assisted with and guest conducted the Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Winds, Symphonic Band, co-conducted the LSU Chamber Winds, worked with all aspects of The Golden Band from Tigerland marching band, and with the Bengal Brass athletic band. Mack had the great fortune and opportunity to arrange music and design drill for both Tigerband and the Bengal Brass.

Before attending graduate school, Mack was the Director of Bands at North Forney High School just east of Dallas, TX. He opened North Forney High School and created the band program in 2009 where he oversaw all operations of the high school bands and middle school feeder program. Opening a high school was a special opportunity for Mack to learn how to build a band from the ground up. While at North Forney High School, Mack's ensembles received numerous awards and accolades, but most importantly, many of his students continued on to participate in music beyond high school.

Mack earned his undergraduate degree from The University of Texas at Austin in Music and Human Learning. While at UT, Mack served as the drum major of the Longhorn Band from 2003-2005 and as a trumpet section leader in 2002. Once Mack graduated from UT, he was an assistant director at Irving Nimitz High School in the DFW metroplex and then moved to be an assistant director at Forney High School just east of Dallas, TX.

An active adjudicator, clinician, music arranger, and drill designer, Mack truly loves all aspects of the wind band world. In his spare time, Mack enjoys cooking and bar-b-que (they are very different according to him), playing golf, and spending time with his wife Rachel and daughter Imogen.

Christopher Bulding is a second-year graduate student at Illinois State University currently pursuing a Master of Music degree in Wind Conducting under Dr. Anthony Marinello and studying Flute under Dr. Kimberly Risinger.

In addition to his studies, Christopher is also one of the three band graduate teaching assistants. His duties include assisting with the Big Red Marching Machine, Pep Band, assisting with undergraduate conducting courses, as well as guest conducting the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, Symphonic Band, and University Band.

Born and raised in Aurora Colorado, **Colby Powers** has a bachelor's degree in music education with a minor in Jazz Studies from Illinois Wesleyan University. He currently attends Illinois State University as he pursues his Master of Music in Wind Band Conducting. While his primary instrument is the clarinet, he has also taken lessons and performed on the alto saxophone, tenor saxophone, and bassoon.

Colby has played in Orchestra, Wind Ensembles, Jazz bands, Jazz Combos, and Musical Pits at both the collegiate level and as a gigging musician. Professionally, Colby has made a name for himself in Bloomington Normal as a jazz band director, private studio teacher, and performer. For the past three years, Colby has been an Assistant Jazz Band Director with the Normal West High School jazz band, named the "Jazz Katz." This year, Colby added an additional jazz band position as a Jazz Director at George Evans Junior High. In both positions, Mr. Powers has been responsible for leading and scheduling rehearsals, choosing appropriate music, and preparing for performances.

Outside of teaching in public schools, Colby's personal clarinet studio is currently made up of over 12 students all from a wide variety of backgrounds. Colby is also a teacher through Illinois Wesleyans preparatory program which supplies lessons to local kids in the Bloomington-Normal Area. As an up-andcoming music educator Colby strives to inspire his students to follow their passion and go find what makes them happy in this world. **Kendra Chaney** is a dedicated music educator currently pursuing her Master's degree in Music Education at Illinois State University.
